Our personal experience with adopting *shelter* animals has been an incredibly rewarding one. Pet ownership has its challenges but not unlike any other life experience that brings with it enough good to outweigh the negatives. I believe there is a spiritual blessing in opening up your home and your heart to those animals who perhaps once knew love but lost their good home through unfortunate circumstances; or those who never knew love and are starving for it, who would do anything they can for you, just to know and feel what every living thing was born to feel before they die: Love.

I have learned that the *issues* we find with animals ... and even with parenting our children ... are mostly a reflection of our own misunderstanding of how we feel our lives *should* be. Those issues represent the truth that we are not always *in control*, and they bring with them an opportunity to draw upon a greater power beyond the limits of our own vision and cognitive reasoning. Then real love and power are released ... to us and through us

... leaving us stronger and more wholesome human beings. How? By illustrating that the *problems* are really just keys to finding our greatest potential and capacity for love. Then we understand that no matter how our journey unfolds, we will be OK.

In that section you will find out how to adopt, how to find a best fit for you and your family, and how to support the work of those who care for the animals while they wait for a *forever home*.
